Project background & approach

The new climate change agreement, agreed in Paris in December 2015, is to be further defined with rules, modalities and procedures by the Conference of Parties. Article 6, which covers markets and non-markets, is an important element in the Agreement, which will need a substantial amount of political and technical decisions to be taken before it can be implemented.


This meeting is part of the project "Implementation of markets and non-markets provisions in the Paris Agreement" project, which aims to create an informal atmosphere, where the main objective is to explore, discover, explain and understand different points of view related to the issues in Article 6 of the Paris Agreement. That is, to understand the options available to define rules, modalities and procedures on Article 6 of the Paris Agreement, as well as the consequences of adopting each option.

What is also very important is, to the extent that participants are willing to explain, to understand the different views, and more importantly, WHY these views are held. The discussions will be free and informal. They are generally started with a presentation from ICTSD, and launched with reflections from the participating negotiators. Discussions will be held under Chatham House rules (views expressed can be quoted, but cannot be attributed to any of the participants). At the end of each meeting we will not produce summaries, but a Reflection Note, with what the Chair took back from the discussions.

Above all, this process is totally separated from the UNFCCC negotiating process. There is no intention, or mandate, to produce any text or negotiate an outcome.

This project is made possible by contributions received from a number of donors including Australia, Canada, Finland, Sweden, Norway, European Commission, France, Germany, Japan, Switzerland, New Zealand, and the World Bank.


The Chair of SBI will provide an overall view of how this issue melds with some of the items that are related and come under SBI.

- a) An outline of what is intended to be included in the submissions by Parties, which are due by March 17, as a result of the discussions in SBSTA in Marrakech. This is not necessarily intended to go into the substance of the submission, unless Parties are willing to do so. It is more intended to provide an opportunity to discuss what the outline/table of contents will be, what is the focus of the submission, and the format. While each Party will be, as always, free to make any submission it chooses, it may be useful to be coordinated and try to avoid that submissions vary widely in format, focus, and content.
- b) Many countries have referred in their NDCs to the use of market mechanisms domestically, as well as the use of international markets, towards meeting NDCs. To the extend possible the presenters should also try and also cover in their presentations what is the expected evolution and use of domestic and international markets for their NDCs.

Such a long session can easily become unfocused, unless the presentations are very much to the point. Each presenter will have 10 min for the presentation and 10 min for discussions. It is not a lot, but it will allow an overview of what Parties intend to focus in their submissions, which will be critical if we are to make progress in June in Bonn.

9:00 Relationship between Article 6.2 & 6.4



There are many views on Art 6.2 & 6.4, as well as the relationship between them. There are horizontal issues, which appear in both articles, such as sustainable development, environmental integrity, double counting. Is there a relationship between these concepts in Art 6.2 and Art 6.4? The governance is different, which implies that the international compliance value of units emerging from 6.2 and 6.4 will be determined in different ways. Finally, some see





Art 6.4 as CDM successor issuing credits, while Art 6.2 is seen as a successor to Art 17 of the Kyoto Protocol. How will ITMOs and units from Art 6.4 relate and interact?

Accounting will be discussed in the IEA session on February 20th, where the focus will be, byand-large, on case studies on how accounting will be treated in different circumstances. Since accounting is one of the key issues to ensure both for a well functioning market, as well as the environmental integrity of the market, which is clearly identified as a "must" in both Art 6.2 and 6.4, it is important that the we identify the issues that need to be addressed under SBSTA. This session is totally focused on the accounting issues, which will need to have precise answers in the package that will be the rulebook for Art 6. As such it is hoped that the outcome of this session will be a list of issues, which the presenters, and the discussions that follow with the participants, will identify.

11:30 **CDM Transition**

It has been often remarked that the CDM has been an important element of the KP, and what some may today call Carbon Markets 1.0. However, for many, the CDM is coming to its natural end. The reality is that it is unclear if the CDM will continue, will be transposed into Art 6.4, what will happen to the existing projects, the CERs that were issued, the projects which were registered, or for that matter future issuances of CERs. This can be seen also as an important issue for the credibility of the carbon market, which has suffered from a significant drop in prices and with that, the viability of the projects, which depended on the CDM. How will all lessons learned from the CDM (and JI) be used, what will happen to the accumulated knowledge, the methodologies, the existing infrastructure and regulatory set up? What are the options?

The presentations will focus on

- Lessons learned form CDM governance
- Lessons learned from the use of the SD tool?
- Options from the transition period
